THE LESSON OF SEPT. 11 — WHAT YOU DON'T KNOW CAN HURT YOU

MOSAIC To Offer Expanded, Unfiltered Middle East Newscasts On the Anniversary of the 9/11 Terrorist Attacks

(San Francisco, August 27, 2002) — One of the biggest lessons of Sept. 11 is that what we don't know *can* hurt us. As the nation remembers the anniversary of the terrorist attacks on America, viewers can tune into a special expanded version of WorldLink TV's MOSAIC — the only program on national TV where Americans see what people throughout the Mideast are watching that day.

WorldLink TV's daily "MOSAIC: World News from the Middle East" is a firsthand, uncensored presentation of news broadcasts direct from the increasingly volatile region. Available to more than 18 million satellite TV households in the U.S., MOSAIC is the nation's first unexpurgated and translated compilation of the daily news from over a dozen key countries in the Middle East. With headlines from broadcasters in Egypt, Lebanon, the Palestinian Authority, Syria, Iran, Iraq and beyond, MOSAIC even offers viewers an inside glimpse at countries that don't have diplomatic relations with the U.S.

"Even as domestic media inundates us with reports of suicide bombings, retaliatory Israeli actions, hidden al-Qaeda networks, and Saddam Hussein's weapons of mass destruction, there is a feeling that Americans are not getting *all* the news from the Mideast," said WorldLink President Kim Spencer. "Our special MOSAIC newscast offers a unique insight into the way people in the Middle East view the events of 9/11 and the West's response to terrorism."

Says WorldLink board member Harry Belafonte: "MOSAIC's unadulterated broadcasts from the Middle East are enlightening and imperative for anyone seeking a greater understanding of Middle Eastern perspectives. As a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador, I am reminded daily of the pitfalls of relying solely on an American viewpoint."

Punctuating MOSAIC's diverse perspectives — "reality TV" in its purest form —is the job of Jamal Dajani, a Palestinian-American, and David Michaelis, an Israeli, who grew up three miles apart in Jerusalem. Mr. Dajani is the producer of MOSAIC and Mr. Michaelis is WorldLink's Director of Current Affairs. "These news reports are seen by 250 million viewers in the Middle East and Europe. We believe it is a broadcasting breakthrough to show them in the US." said Jamal Dajani.

The MOSAIC Special Reports will air on WorldLink TV at 10:00pm Eastern Time (7:00pm Pacific Time) on Wednesday, September 11 and Thursday September 12. The regular daily MOSAIC program is broadcast Monday through Friday at 6:30pm Eastern Time and 11:30pm Pacific Time.

About WorldLink TV:

Founded in 1999, WorldLink TV is the only U.S. network offering a global perspective on news, current events and culture, presenting viewpoints seldom covered in the U.S. media. In fact, 95% of the network's first-run documentaries on global issues have never before been shown in the U.S.

WorldLink is seen nationwide via satellite broadcast on DIRECTV channel 375 and on DISH Network channel 9410 and is accessible to more than 18 million households in the U.S. Select programming is also streamed at www.worldlink.org. WorldLink TV streaming is available through the generous collaboration of the Instructional and Information Technology Division of the California State Polytechnic University, Pomona.
